History: The Nevada State Seal of Financial Literacy

Adopted on June 5, 2019, Senate Bill 314 established a State Seal of Financial Literacy to be affixed to the diploma of students graduating from public High School in Nevada, starting with the graduating class of 2023.

This bill supplements SB 249 passed in the 2017 legislative session requiring instruction in Financial Literacy in grades 3-12 in Nevada.

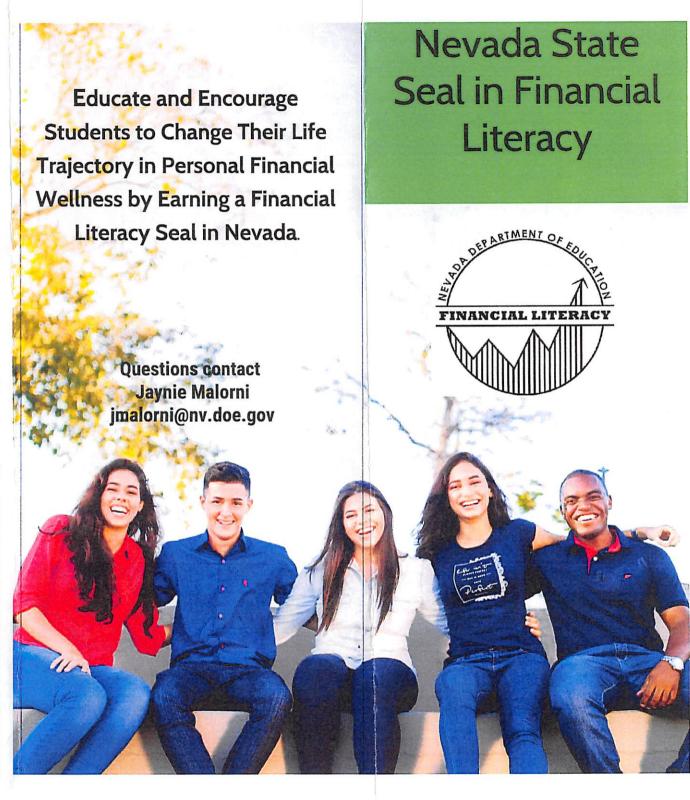


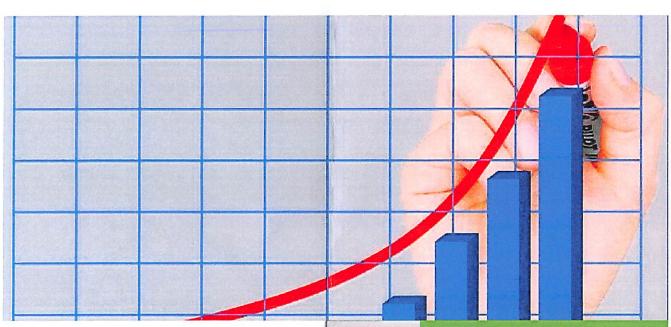
How Will This Benefit Student Lives?

Requirements for Obtaining the Seal

GPA

Students must earn at least a 3.25 grade point average, on a 4.0 grading scale, or a 3.85 weighted grade point average, on a grading scale AND

Demonstrate Proficiency

- Earn a score of 85% on a Financial Literacy Assessment provided by the Nevada Department of Education OR
- A grade of B or higher in a college level course in financial literacy instruction OR
- A score of gold or higher on the ACT National Career Readiness
 Certificate AND

Coursework (3 Credits)

Economics, Financial Literacy, Life Skills with Financial Literacy, Micro/Macro Economics, US Government, US History, and World History
